



Exemplary activities	 Development, modification and testing of joint cross-border services connecting vocational and tertiary education graduates as well as employers in the blue and green economy sectors (e.g. cross-border job search platforms, multi-lingual job applications, [] dedicated [post-graduate] study profiles for blue and green sector companies, etc.); provision of tools or schemes for harmonisation and international recognition of professional or vocational qualifications in the blue and green economy sectors;
	preparation and deployment of cross-border internships, apprenticeships and different forms of exchanges for the labour force aimed at acquiring qualifications necessary for blue and green sector professions in the programme regions;

Due to an administrative reorganisation of districts and district free cities conducted in Mecklenburg-Vorpommern (DE) in 2011, the total area covered by the programme has been enlarged in comparison to the period 2007-2013, amounting to 118,5 thousand km² in the programming period 2014-2020.
